Your last letter, which you were so kind as to send to me on the 26<sup>th</sup> August, [5] reached me on the 13<sup>th</sup> of this month, and from it I saw that you have already dispatched 5 copies of the Haidn Creation<sup>5</sup> to me, addressed to the Mairischen Buchhandlung.<sup>6</sup> Yet, since I have so far received from the bookseller neither the *Requem*<sup>7</sup> so kindly sent to me nor the 5 copies, I have already made enquiries there, but they claim to know nothing of having received such a thing. [10] I am thus left in very great fear that these packets may have been lost entirely. Here follows my answer to your two letters of the 15<sup>th</sup> *June* and 1<sup>st</sup> *August*.<sup>8</sup>

The reason you are receiving this answer of mine so late was my mistake of enclosing this letter in the packet in which I wished to send you the score of the *opera* [15] *La Finta giardiniera*. But when I sent this off to the bookseller's for fast delivery, then they did not accept it from me, the messenger therefore took this packet to the post office and obtained a confirmation of receipt. But a fortnight later, when I was thinking that this packet was already well under way, the messenger brought it back to me again and remarked that the post-coach cannot leave Salzburg because of a blocked post-route. [20] Thus, to my greatest consternation, I realised for the first time how wrong I had been in not handing in the letter separately at the post, since it was so very necessary to you regarding the safe receipt of your letters and enclosure. I therefore ask you not to take a grave view of this mistake and indeed to inform me as soon as possible [25] how I should in future send you the *opera* and the other packets. I shall immediately make a note of the 12 ducats<sup>9</sup> and the sum owed for the *copies* sent so as to present an account in [due]<sup>10</sup> time.
