Vienna / To / Messrs. Breitkopf and Härtel, / Leipzig / Entrusted / to Herr Traeg³

Most highly honoured sirs,

[Vienna, 5th November, 1800]

I make haste to express to you my great obligation and gratitude for your customary kindness regarding the copies of the 8th *Cahier*.⁴ [5] You have thus once again brought me great joy.

I may still allow myself to hope that you will show me the promised kindness either to send me, in recompense for the expenses I had contrary to your wishes, the 6 copies of the *Requiem* or, <u>failing that</u>, the copies of the *Cahiers* I suggested.⁵

[10] Herr Stoll, *Regens Chori*⁶ in Baden, not far from Vienna, still has letters from Mozart. I have asked him for them, and he has promised them to me. As soon as this happens, I shall at once have the pleasure of making them available to you.
