Most nobly born
Most estimable sir!

St. Gilgen, 9<sup>th</sup> *Fev*: 1801.

This protracted silence on your part places me in the greatest embarrassment, since I have received no news from you of either your receipt of the *opera La Finta giardiniera*, <sup>4</sup> [5] which I sent you in the month of October last year, or then of the copied pieces of music which I sent in the same month, or of my letter of 2<sup>nd</sup> 8*ober*. <sup>5</sup> Since it does indeed seem impossible to me that they could have all been lost, since each was sent separately, I would have pursued enquiries with you on this matter a long time ago [10] if I had not always been much too busy because of the many French officers <sup>6</sup> who travel to and fro every day to eat and stay with us.

Now there was also a French general<sup>7</sup> here with us recently, who only travelled here in order to get to know me since he is my brother's greatest admirer, he said; [15] he himself played the *clavier* excellently, and told me that he purchases for himself all the Mozart works which are published in Leibzig, and as soon as he gets back to France he will heap particular praise on this edition, since my brother's works are particularly appreciated throughout all France. He asked me if I might perhaps have some as yet unknown compositions by him, [20] I told him I had none, but I knew for certain that there were still some in Salzburg, although they had told me that they were lost. He then said to me that if I wished, he would procure me all the pieces which I know are in Salzburg, and that even if the devil in hell had them, he would surely get them for me.

[25] Now, since I wished to obtain them only for you, I could not give him a definite answer before I had received news from you. I therefore beg you, since it is most urgent, to write to me at once saying whether you wish to have copies of the *opera La Finta Semplice*, the *Re pastore*, *il Sogno di Scipione*, the Latin play,<sup>8</sup> the German funeral music,<sup>9</sup> and the German *oratorio*,<sup>10</sup> [30] or whether you already possess the scores of all of these; inform me correspondingly so that I know what answer to give the esteemed general: in the sure hope of receiving an answer as soon as possible I remain, in the greatest haste,
