1349. Maria Anna, Imperial Baroness von Berchtold zu Sonnenburg, to Breitkopf & Härtel, Leipzig

Most nobly born!
Most highly estimable sir!

Salzburg, 1<sup>st</sup> *June*, 1802.

With this letter I inform you that I have received from the copyist the *symphonies* indicated<sup>4</sup> along with the *offertorium*,<sup>5</sup> [5] and will send them at the first opportunity. I also include the list; the esteemed music director<sup>6</sup> has not yet found the *symphonies* marked with a cross, five in number, on the other hand he sends you the opening bars of a *vesper*,<sup>7</sup> *symphony* and *seranata*<sup>8</sup> on the back which, he told me, he alone possesses here. If you have none of these, therefore, write telling me, [10] and at the same time be so good as to inform me how far I can go regarding a *douseur*, <sup>9</sup> if the esteemed music director, as sole owner, does not himself ask for anything? — The esteemed music director will also endeavour to locate the opera *il Re pastore*. <sup>10</sup>

The copyist's invoice which I paid amounts to 28 florins 21 kreuzers. [15] Be so kind as to allow me a question: when Maier's bookshop<sup>11</sup> receives an instruction from you to pay me, should I give the invoice to their accounts office or send it to you? ---
