1369. Maria Anna, Imperial Baroness¹ von Berchtold zu Sonnenburg,² to Breitkopf & Härtel,³ Leipzig

A / Monsieur / Monsieur Breitkopf et / Haertel. / à / Leibzig

Most nobly born!
Most highly estimable sir!

Salzburg, 15th May, 1805.

I cannot understand that since your last letter⁴ of 25th *November*, 1804, [5] to which I replied immediately on 6th *December*, ⁵ I have received nothing more from you.

Nor would I have burdened you with this communication if I had not frequently been asked why no more volumes of Mozart and Haidn's works⁶ have been dispatched for such a long time. I was asked to enquire of you in this matter,⁷ [10] and then I must ask again if you still wish me to have the masses by Michael Haidn⁸ laid out in score and sent to you? Since you have not written to me for such a long time, I thought you could possibly have obtained them already, and then I could be writing in vain. [15] I ask you to give me an answer if you please; I would have put this question to you much earlier, but I was away for a time. If there is nothing more I can do to be of service to you, be so good as to inform me by whom I should transfer the money I still have for you in my possession,⁹ then the complete accounts will be sent along with that. In my letter of 29^{th} April, 10 1804, I asked you to send kindly back to me the 3 sonatas, 11 [25] the little piece for 4 hands, 12 and the little song 13 which I had sent you if you have had them copied, because I would like to keep them as the first *compositions* by my brother, but to this I received no reply ----

The latter was also declared universal heir by Breitkopf shortly before his death in 1800.
